ORDINANCE #25-13

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOROUGH OF NORTHVALE, IN THE COUNTY OF BERGEN, NEW JERSEY, AUTHORIZING A SPECIAL EMERGENCY APPROPRIATION IN THE AMOUNT OF \$110,000 FOR THE PREPARATION OF A STORMWATER SYSTEM MAP IN, BY AND FOR THE BOROUGH

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Borough Council of the Borough of Northvale, in the County of Bergen, New Jersey, as follows:

Section 1. Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:4-53, the sum of \$110,000 is hereby appropriated for the preparation of a stormwater system map and shall be deemed a special emergency appropriation as defined and provided for in N.J.S.A. 40A:4-53 and 40A:4-55.

Section 2. The amount to finance the appropriation shall be provided for in succeeding annual budgets by the inclusion of at least 1/5 of the amount authorized, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:4-55.

Section 3. A certified copy of this ordinance shall be filed with the Director of the Division of Local Government Services.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect at the time and in the manner provided by law.

ORDINANCE – SECOND READING AND PUBLIC HEARING-#25-12

ORDINANCE #25-12

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOROUGH OF NORTHVALE, COUNTY OF BERGEN, STATE OF NEW JERSEY, TO AMEND SECTION 200-5 ENTITLED "ENUMERATION OF DISTRICTS; BOUNDARIES; MAP" OF CHAPTER 200, ENTITLED "ZONING" OF THE GENERAL LEGISLATION ORDINANCES OF THE BOROUGH OF NORTHVALE

WHEREAS, by Borough of Northvale Ordinance #1026-2020 adopted December 9, 2020, the Borough of Northvale amended Chapter 200, Article II of the Code of the Borough of Northvale to incorporate a new zoning map.

WHEREAS, the amendments set forth above resulted in Block 915, Lots 1, 2, 4, and 6 being inadvertently rezoned from Light Industrial (LI) to Residential Single-Family (R 7.5).

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, by the Borough Council of the Borough of Northvale as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter 200 of the Code of the Borough of Northvale, Article II entitled "Districts" is hereby amended and supplemented by adding the following <u>underlined</u> text and by removing text in <u>strikeout</u>:

A. Classification and use.

(1) For the purpose as set forth in § 200-2 of this chapter; for the purpose of promoting the health, safety, morals and general welfare of the community; for the purpose of lessening congestion in the streets; for the purpose of securing safety from fire, panic and other dangers; for the purpose of preventing the overcrowding of land and avoiding undue concentration of population; for the purpose of facilitating adequate provisions of transportation, water, sewerage, schools, parks and other public requirements; for the purpose of conserving the value of buildings and encouraging the most appropriate use of land throughout the Borough; for the purpose of providing for public health, comfort and general welfare in living and working conditions; for the purpose of regulating and restricting the location of trades and industries and the location of buildings designed for specified uses; for the purpose of regulating and limiting the height and bulk of buildings hereafter erected; and for the purpose of regulating and determining the area of yards, courts and other open spaces hereafter erected, the Borough of Northvale is hereby divided into the following classes of zones as shown on the Building Zone Map Zoning Map prepared by Neglia Group, dated August 2019 2025, adopted with such amendments as may be made by ordinance from time to time, is made part of this chapter.



B. Zoning Map. The zoning districts as set forth in this chapter are bounded and defined as shown on the map entitled the "Zoning Map," dated October 2020 August 2025 which map, with all explanatory matter thereon, and properly certified by the Borough Clerk of the Borough of Northvale, is hereby made a part of this chapter.

SECTION 2. The Official Zoning Map shall be changed for the following Block and Lots to reflect the correct zoning designation of LI Light Industrial within the RMI Residential Multi-family Inclusionary Overlay Zone:

Block 915 Lots 1, 2, 4, and 6

SECTION 3. Notice of the hearing on this ordinance shall be provided as required by the Municipal Land Use Law, N.J.S.A. 40:55D-1 et seq.

SECTION 4. Prior to the hearing on adoption of this ordinance, this ordinance shall be referred to the Borough of Northvale Planning Board pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40:55D-26.

SECTION 5. All other ordinances, part of ordinances, or other local requirements that are inconsistent or in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of any inconsistency or conflict, and the provisions of this ordinance apply.

SECTION 6. Notwithstanding that any provision of this Ordinance is held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, all remaining provisions of the Ordinance shall continue to be of full force and effect.

SECTION 7. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon (1) adoption; (2) publication in accordance with the laws of the State of New Jersey; and (3) filing of the final form of adopted ordinance by the Clerk with the Bergen County Planning Board pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40:55D-16.

MAYOR & COUNCIL REPORTS

Council President McMorrow – Ambulance Corps. statistics for the month of July – there were 25 calls – 19 to Northvale, 1 Rockleigh residential, 3 Rockleigh Jewish Home, 1 Harrington Park, and 1 Closter. The Ambulance Corps. had 15 total calls in the month of August. There were 10 calls to Northvale, 2 Rockleigh Jewish Home, 1 Norwood, 1 Harrington Park, and 1 Closter. Congratulations to our 3 newest EMTs: Presley Saunier, Serena Liang, and Giana Guercio. We wish them luck on their EMS journey! We are accepting applications for new members. Doctors, nurses, paramedics or trainees – we will provide all training at no cost. Please email nvac266@gmail.com if interested.

Preschool – we are so excited to welcome everyone back for a brand new school year! Our Preschool is at full capacity and the classrooms are looking extra fresh after being fully repainted over the summer. We are thrilled to introduce our new Pre-K 3 teacher, Ms. Brittney Duty, who has already been a wonderful addition to our team. Some upcoming events – back to school night is in October, fire truck visit is also in October, t-shirt fundraiser is happening now, and a carousel fundraiser will be kicking off soon for the holidays. It is shaping up to be a fun and busy fall and we are so happy to be back at school with our Preschool family.

Police Department had a total of 612 calls for the month of August – 121 traffic stops, 89 selective enforcement traffic details, 42 building/property checks, 39 burglary alarms, 29 suspicious incident calls, 26 medical assistance calls, 23 civilian assist calls, 20 motor vehicle



crashes. There was a DWI arrest, 29 year old male from Blauvelt, New York and a shoplifting arrest 54 year old male from Orangeburg, New York.

We are proud to inform you that Officers Carroll, Criscuolo, and Sullivan have successfully completed their term of probation which is a term of one year from their academy graduation date. All have exhibited the skills and performances required of the position of police officer and as of August 9th moved to permanent full time status.

Coming up on October 1st at Starbucks, the police department will be hosting their Coffee with a Cop event. Stop on by after the kids get dropped off at school for some coffee and conversation with our local law enforcement. Special thanks to everyone who participated in town day.

Councilman Bakalian – Planning board had one meeting in August. Building Department issued 16 permits and updated 4 permits in the month of August. Fees collected for August were \$72,459 as compared to August 2024 which were \$16,937. This was a \$55,522 increase from last August. The year-to-date fees collected are \$287,999 which is \$166,886 more than last year due to permits for home renovations and additions.

Councilman Menafra – Fire Department statistic for the month of August – 18 emergency calls totaling 74.5 man hours which include 8 fire alarms, 1 CO alarm, 2 utilities incidents, 3 hazardous conditions and 4 smoke conditions. There were 7 non-emergency calls totaling 127.5 hours which includes 4 company drills and 1 fire academy training event.

Fire Prevention statistics for the month of August – 22 inspections and 11 reinspections. Northvale Board of Education – no board meeting since my last report however the school year is underway and off to a good start. Some upcoming school events – September 11th remembrance/discussions will take place in all classrooms tomorrow, back to school night for Pre K-3rd will be September 15th, back to school night for 4-8th grade will be September 29th. Project graduation car wash and clothing drive is September 27th from 10 am to 1 pm at Northvale Public School. The next regular board meeting will be held on Thursday, September 18th at 6:30 pm in the All Purpose Room.

Northern Valley Board of Education – a regular meeting was held on August 25th. Superintendent's report: new access control system installed on all school access doors, 400 students achieved AP scholar designation, NJGPA exam results which were taken by 11th graders in the spring results show 92% achieved ELA graduation ready status and 85% achieved mathematics graduation ready status. NVOT team room project is underway. NVOT second turf field project start is imminent, as soccer goals were moved off the upper field and heavy equipment has been staged in the adjacent parking lot. Next meeting is September 15th at Northern Valley central gym.

Councilman Mattessich – DPW did a great job prepping Hogan Park for Town Day and the 9/11 memorial. DPW continues their normal maintenance with filling potholes, chipping and collecting brush.

Senior Center – on September 11th Bruce Hammer will be discussing the events of 9/11. The monthly breakfast is September 16th. I visited the center last week and chatted with Maureen. On September 25th the center will be hosting a vaccine clinic for seniors wishing to receive the flu shot and other vaccines that are available.

Golden Age Club – I saw Augie at Town Day and everything is going well. They are full with members and taking a lot of trips.

Recreation – soccer has begun. There were no meetings in July or August. The next meeting is September 16th at 7:30 pm.

Councilwoman Fernandez – Library issued 19 new Library cards. Summer reading was a success. They had 49 kids attend and had a summer reading pizza party. Next board meeting is September 24th.

Community Garden had their first garden party and was pretty well attended.

Beautification will be meeting next week to discuss season ending plans and to look forward to planning a little differently next year for certain things. They will also plan another event.

Councilman Sokoloski – Board of Health will be hosting a free rabies clinic for dogs and cats which will be held on October 7th from 6:30 to 7:30 pm at the DPW garage. This is a great opportunity to have your pets vaccinated for free. The next Board of Health meeting is October 16th at 7:00 pm which I will be unable to attend.

Northern Valley Greenway – nothing new to report but we are moving in a positive direction. No change in grants since last month.



DPW did a great job at the park for Town Day. The fields looked great and everyone seemed to enjoy themselves.

Mayor McGuire – Thank you to everyone who participated in the 9/11 Memorial event we had earlier this evening in the park. Special kudos to the DPW and Fire Department for obtaining the piece of steel beam from the World Trade Center and to the DPW for installing it. Thank you to everyone who helped make Town Day possible. We were faced with a decision whether or not to have it on Saturday because of the pending rain. We decided to go ahead with it and make it an hour earlier mainly because of the rain extending to Sunday afternoon. The field would have been a mess. Thank you to Iris Fallon and Kevin Trainor for organizing, the DPW for making everything look great, our police, fire and ambulance, boy scouts for being there and our volunteers who helped cook – Maureen and Jane from the Senior Center, Borough Clerk Fran, Judge Martone, and the Council. Despite the weather, we gave out 800 hot dogs. At our October 8th Mayor and Council meeting we will be dedicating two plaques to hang here in the chambers – one for Charlie Amorosso and one for Judge Roger Hauser – to honor their multidecade service to the Borough.

Reminders for two October events – Saturday Oct. 4th from 9am-1pm in our parking lot will be the annual paper shredding event. Paper only. No plastic, binders, cardboard or x-rays. Councilman Sokoloski mentioned the Free Rabies Clinic.

We have a new event this year, thanks to Councilwoman Fernandez, called Pumpkins for Pink on Saturday October 25th at Veterans Park from 12-2. It is a breast cancer awareness and fundraising event as proceeds will go to Memorial Sloan Kettering. People come in, purchase pumpkins, which the suggested donation is between \$10-\$15, paint them pink, and make donations to Memorial Sloan Kettering. We have a website set up for people to make donations too. There will be music and refreshments.

BOROUGH ATTORNEY REPORT

Mr. Ralph – we received one challenge on the Housing Fair Share Plan from the Fair s\Share Housing itself, no other outside challenges. Mr. Ferraro is working on this with Ms. Knight on responding to the challenge.

BOROUGH ENGINEER REPORT

Mr. Loverich – spoke with Lyndsay and they are requesting additional information. She was not concerned what was inside the challenge.

Grace Avenue - have been pushing the contractor to do this work this month. It is for new curbing and restoring asphalt pavement.

OPEN MEETING TO THE PUBLIC

Barry Hirschberg, 403 ½ **Argenti Place** – was awarded 100% total disability. He filed the letter with the Clerk two weeks ago and thought this would be on the agenda. Mayor McGuire responded that the Borough Attorney is making sure we do the right thing. Mr. Hirscherg filed the papers over 10 years ago and just received notice on August 13, 2025 that he was awarded the 100% disability. The VA approved this on September 30, 2022.

Chris Bombino, 123 Rockland Avenue – is here against Ordinance 1903-2024 and will continue to come to meetings as long as this ordinance is in effect. He was unable to come to the August meeting. He did attend Open Mic Night and spoke with the council people that were present. Mr. Bombino went over all the exhibits that he had emailed to the Mayor, Council, and Chief Ostrow. There is now ample parking in Mufson's large lot. He believes there are about 75-100 spots available. The church safety patrol are actively out there on Sunday directing the vehicles into the Mufson lot. Mr. Bombino feels that if the parking is eliminated, there will still be bad behavior but not overly concerned about it. There is still no one parking on Oak Street. Mr. Bombino said if the no parking is reinstated, it will significantly reduce the incidents that have been occurring. It will restore promise to the neighborhood.
